Aims

- To map graduates' jobs and how they looked for them
- Understand how the degree has contributed to graduates' ability to perform their job and/or to achieve their current work position



The relation with our WP and with the previous WPs

- The platform's purpose is to provide information on jobs in public health in Israel, make job offers accessible to Israeli students and graduates, and enable officials in public health institutions to recruit employees
- To tailor the platform to the needs of the graduates, we wanted to understand some points better:
 - How the alumni found their jobs and if there is a gap in job finding that the platform can help overcome
 - If MPH studies helped in finding jobs, improving and extending competencies in the current jobs, or in getting a promotion
 - The survey also connects and adds another aspect (of the "customer's" side) to the previous work-packages activities (the mapping of MPH studies and employers' needs)



Methods

Dear graduate,

A 16 multiple-choice questions (mostly)



Constructed on the basis of a group discussion that included faculty and students



Approved by the Institutional Ethics Committee



Will be followed up by in-depth interviews with consenting graduates

Sent to 849 alumni who graduate in the last 10 years (by E-mail)



127 responded (14.9%)










Have you changed your job after receiving your degree?



28.3% of respondents changed their **job definition** post degree




To what extent did the degree you studied help you find your current job?





How much is your work related to the degree you studied?






To what extent does the degree you studied help you to contribute to your current workplace?






To what extent do the skills* you obtained during your studies help you perform your job?



*Skills such as statistical analysis, scientific writing, critical science reading and etc.




Do you believe that other skills, which you did not acquire during your studies, would have been helpful in your current job?

Summary and conclusions

• Students mostly independently apply to the workplace (40.0%) or get help from colleagues (26.7%) or friends (19.2%)

- The MPH degree did help in changing job definitions
 - Most graduates already have jobs in heath system when they start their degree

 40% of students do feel that the degree helped them in getting a promotion (in rank or salary) in their current job

• 50-60% do feel that the degree helped them to better contribute to their current workplace and to perform their jobs better

Conclusions

- We need to do a better job in assisting organized structured job finding pathways
- The educational content contributes in practice, but further adjustment to fieldwork is needed
