




Daily new confirmed COVID-19 deaths per million people





Limited testing and challenges in the attribution of the cause of death means that the number of confirmed deaths may not be an accurate count of the true number of deaths from COVID-19.






An evacuation flight from COVID-struck Europe to much safer Mongolia

ongolia has had the best COVID-19 response in the world. Not only do they have zero deaths, they have zero local **transmissions**. Mongolia didn't flatten the curve or crush the curve they were just like 'fuck curves'. In Mongolia, there simply wasn't an epidemic at all.

With the outbreak of novel coronavirus disease 2019 (COVID-19) we are currently experiencing a worldwide emergency affecting all societies. Fortunately, we have learnt much since the 1918/19 influenza pandemic, and we have come a long way towards controlling infectious diseases. Smallpox has been eradicated, cases of measles and poliomyelitis have been drastically reduced, and much has been achieved in mitigating HIV. Still, we now must coordinate efforts on a global scale to stop the spread of COVID-19, an epidemic with grave consequences. Globalization, ease of travel and open borders present challenges; but the degree of scientific progress and the free exchange of rapidly generated knowledge also afford important opportunities not available in previous outbreaks. These opportunities must be put to good use; this is where public health plays a critical role.







COVID-19 shows why united action is needed for more robust international health architecture

The COVID-19 pandemic is the biggest challenge to the global community since the 1940s. At that time, following the devastation of two world wars, political leaders came together to forge the multilateral system. The aims were clear: to bring countries together, to dispel the temptations of isolationism and nationalism, and to address the challenges that could only be achieved together in the spirit of solidarity and cooperation, namely peace, prosperity, health and security.

Today, we hold the same hope that as we fight to overcome the COVID-19 pandemic together, we can build a more robust international health architecture that will protect future generations. There will be other pandemics and other major health emergencies. No single government or multilateral agency can address this threat alone. The question is not if, but when. Together, we must be better prepared to predict, prevent, detect, assess and effectively respond to pandemics in a highly coordinated fashion. The COVID-19 pandemic has been a stark and painful reminder that nobody is safe until everyone is safe.





The Covid-19 pandemic has inflicted serious damage on the economy, on employment, and on household disposable incomes.

The UK Government's job retention and income maintenance schemes have mitigated some of the damage, and the increasing availability of vaccines will slowly bring the pandemic under control, allowing lockdowns to cease and the economy to return to something like normal: but it will take months, and possibly years, for the economy to recover, and maybe even longer for household disposable incomes to return to adequacy.




