What to visit in Porto & other useful tips

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1. Batalha Square and Church of Santo Ildefonso

At the heart of Porto's historic center lies the enchanting **Praça da Batalha**, a bustling square brimming with history and cultural significance. Dominating this lively plaza is the magnificent **Church of Santo Ildefonso**, an architectural gem renowned for its striking façade adorned with intricate azulejo tilework. Built in the **18th century**, this Baroque church is dedicated to Saint Ildefonso, a revered Spanish bishop, and theologian. Its façade, designed by architect **Nicolau Nasoni**, is adorned with around **11,000 azulejo tiles**, depicting scenes from the life of Saint Ildefonso and religious motifs, creating a mesmerizing visual spectacle that captivates visitors. Inside, the church boasts a lavish interior adorned with gilded altars, ornate sculptures, and magnificent frescoes, offering a glimpse into Porto's rich religious heritage and artistic legacy.



2. São Bento Train Station

Nestled in the heart of Porto, **São Bento Railway Station** stands as a magnificent testament to the city's rich architectural heritage and historical significance. It's considered the **most beautiful railway station in Portugal and one of the 36 most beautiful train stations in the world**, according to Conde Naste
Traveler. Designed by architect José Marques da Silva and inaugurated in **1916**, the station seamlessly
blends **Beaux-Arts and Neo-Manueline styles, adorned with stunning azulejo tilework that depicts
scenes from Portugal's history**, daily life, and transportation evolution. Beyond its architectural splendor,
São Bento is a bustling transportation hub, connecting Porto to various destinations across Portugal,
including Lisbon and the Douro Valley. Welcoming travelers with its grandeur and charm, São Bento Railway
Station is not only a gateway to exploration but also a captivating cultural landmark that enchants visitors
with its timeless allure.



3. Porto Sé Cathedral

4. Muralha Primitiva, Escadas das Verdades and Porta das Mentiras

5. Cais da Ribeira and Dom Luís I Bridge

6. Escadaria and Funicular dos Guindais

7. Fernandina Wall
