

Professor Alison Katherine McCallum MBChB, MSc, FFPH

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Professor Alison McCallum is an experienced public health doctor who joined the Centre for Population Health Sciences, Usher Institute, University of Edinburgh in November 2020 as Visiting (Honorary) Professor of Public Health. She is registered as a specialist with a licence to practice public health medicine, holds recognition of trainer status in the United Kingdom and recognised as a specialist in public health medicine in Finland. Over the last 25 years, she has been a Director of Public Health in Scotland and England, worked at national level in Finland, taught and trained students and professionals in public health and undertaken collaborative research with colleagues in universities across and beyond Europe.
